Sadly, we will shortly also be saying good bye to Father John Greatbach from the Catholic Church. John has supported TACT so well in the leaders' fellowship and his kindness and good humour will be missed – happy retirement John, you have served your community well.

We have welcomed Steve & Lorraine Emery-Wright in TMC who are returning to the West Country and we see their time with us as an encouragement and provision from God.

One of the blessings of this year has been the launch of ROC Tavistock after the ROC Conversation held in June. I truly believe that God is building bridges between faith groups and the voluntary sector and we have the opportunity to reach out with other friends to show God's care for the people around us. Jeff Moles once said: "The church has left the building". How true that is so Let us all play our part in working with others to enhance Tavistock and area.

We pray "thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven". May 2019 be a year where Jesus Christ is increasingly made visible and loved through his people working together in unity with Him. Thank you for all you each are doing as part of the answer to the Lord's Prayer.

STREET PASTORS

It has again been a busy year of Street Pastor activity, though with some of our longer-serving volunteers having retired and with fewer new volunteers to replace them, our overall numbers are slightly down. Please do continue to encourage

others in your respective congregations to come and have a chat to find out more about getting involved. During 2018 we were still able to put out patrol teams on 68 nights through the year and we continue to meet a very real need amongst those out and about in the night-time economy. Our patrols engaged with more than 1,500 people and gave out 120 pairs of flip-flops. Relationships with those that we meet continue to be warm and friendly. The early encouraging experiences of our "daytime patrols" going out in teams of 2 each Friday lunchtime were indicative of what to expect throughout the year. As we now enter our 2nd year of weekly daytime patrols, our teams continue to meet every week with many people who are keen to talk, share concerns and seek encouragement and prayer. Regarding finances, with contributions from the volunteers themselves, generous support from local churches, and favourable responses to grant applications (as with the application to the Police & Crime Commissioner during 2018) our financial situation continues to be sound. Daytime and night-time, Street Pastors continue to offer a powerful Christian witness in our town, and we thank God for His ongoing blessing of this work

SCHOOL PASTORS

The work and witness at Tavistock College continues on a weekly basis on Wednesday lunchtimes during term time, and the last year has seen a real sense of acceptance among the staff and students.

This in part followed the tragic death of a pupil from a drug overdose, when School Pastors went into school immediately following the death announcement on the Monday, and continued all of the week, supporting staff and students alike. This brought about a real sense that God was in the situation, and staff in particular were openly expressing their thanks for our presence.

We are invited to every church service which the College holds, and shows the acceptance we have from the College and it was a real pleasure to get a personal Christmas card from the Principal sent to every School and Prayer Pastor thanking us for our presence during the year.. An offshoot of this work is asthat the students are out on the streets at weekends as they get older, they are aware of the Street Pastors and gladly interact with them.

At present we have a team of 8 School Pastors and 10 Prayer Pastors, so would appreciate anyone who felt the call to this work to take up the challenge and join us. We have the open door to go into the College every day if we could, but our numbers do not allow for this, but an amazing witness as we patrol around the school.

IGNATIAN PRAYER GROUP

The Ignatian Prayer Group is now in its sixth year. After meeting in Mary Tavy last year thanks to Hazel and Nick's kind hospitality, we have returned to 31 Grenville Drive in Tavistock this term.

We are an ecumenical group drawing from a variety of churches in Tavistock. Our aim is to encourage contemplative prayer in the style of St. Ignatius. We normally begin at 7.30 with tea/coffee and biscuits. After a short introduction and prayer, we read a Bible passage together. A time of silence follows in order to contemplate the reading, *either* through Gospel Contemplation as we relate to Jesus in the passage *or* through Lectio Divina, concentrating on a small section of the reading, even just a word, and letting it sink into our hearts. Following this we give the group an opportunity to share briefly anything that has come to them in the prayer time. There is no obligation to do this and there is no discussion as we respect each person during this time. We finish by 9 p.m. with a shared prayer. We welcome new people and the dates for this term are on the TACT website. For further details, feel free to contact us.

Looking to the longer-term future, we are praying about whether to encourage one-off whole day retreats rather than a termly programme. Another possibility is having a week of guided prayer supported by several churches. This would be like a week's retreat but without the expense of going away. Those signing up to it would commit to praying on their own each day, then meet with a prayer companion in a one-to-one session of about half an hour to share any thoughts about their prayer. The prayer companion might then suggest a scripture passage which they might meditate on the following day. It would obviously involve quite a lot of organisation but if you have any thoughts on this, do let us know.

FOOD FOR THOUGHT

This event is an outreach tool for men's evangelism; a kind of first step towards the Kingdom. The idea is that the talk will not try and persuade or preach to anyone but rather it is a lively, interesting, amusing and "cringe-free" talk about the work and experiences of the speaker which will include reference to how they have been guided by their faith or God's intervention or whatever. In other words, it is something that men with no Christian faith can relate to but salted with the speaker's faith. The hope being they may take that next step towards the Kingdom.

This year We have had 3 speakers:

In January Iain Colquhoun a marine engineer for 'Mercy Ships' spoke to us about his work on the world's biggest hospital ship bringing life changing surgery to the poorest of our world.

In April Jim Lewis-Clarke a police officer came to talk with a story of cancer, an encounter with God and healing.

In October Rowland Clear a community chaplain spoke about his mentoring work particularly at Princetown and Channings Wood prisons.

HEALING ROOMS AND COSTA HEALING

Monday evening Healing Rooms in the Society of Friends Meeting House in Bedford car park has been running now for 5 years. We are increasingly busy and getting people who travel sometimes quite a distance to find us. We thank and praise God for the healing that takes place. We believe this is a vital part of Christian ministry. It is

not enough to tell people that Jesus heals without demonstrating that He does. One lady who came, had two hearing aids and still didn't hear very well, rang me a week or so later to say she could hear again and wasn't using hearing aids any more. A man who was very ill with cancer and who was very anxious and afraid was brought by his family one evening. He died some weeks later but the family said he had been greatly moved and had complete peace after receiving prayer. It is a privilege to see people come into Healing Rooms and leave again, having met with the Holy Spirit, which is what it is all about.

More people are coming for prayer in Costa on Tuesday mornings and more engagements are taking place with customers there. It is wonderful that Costa is so open to this taking place in their cafes nationally and that our own Costa is so welcoming.

The Regional Directors of the National Association of Healing Rooms, who have a vast experience in both mission and Healing Rooms, came to Tavistock twice last year, once in September for training new members to the team, and again in November for a refreshing weekend and to share their experiences with us. The teaching was very beneficial and encouraging. There are three new members to the team, which is very helpful for filling the rota and great to see more people interested in this ministry. New members are required to undertake training and to acquire a letter of from their vicar, minister or pastor stating their suitability for this ministry. We are in the process of setting up a Facebook page in order to publicise the Healing Rooms more widely.

I would like to thank all members of both the Monday evening team and the Costa team for their commitment to the ministry and to those churches who support us financially, which enables us to keep going. Please pray that this ministry will continue to grow in bringing God's healing to the people of Tavistock.

Last June TACT hosted a community enhancement event in the Town Hall called Redeeming Our Communities. It was funded by the Police and Crime Commissioner the Fire Service, Churches and private donations. The event attracted 150 people from faith and other voluntary

sector groups to look at ways to celebrate the good in our town and look for ways practically of working together to fill gaps.

Since then we have set up Action Groups which meet every six weeks to work on setting up small projects to tackle the four main areas of concern for Tavistock were identified as;

- 1. Youth & Digital Safety;
- 2. 2. Loneliness and Isolation;
- 3. 3. Mental Health & Addictions;
- 4. 4. Communications and Mapping.

Since then a number of things have been achieved including a PCSO arranging a regular drop in at Wetherspoon's for parents to talk over concerns about young people's issues, local coffee mornings, and the producing of a Tavistock Welcome pack for new arrivals.

We have printed leaflets giving information and a face book page has also been started. We would welcome more help and manpower from the churches in starting a number of other small projects such as initiative to help people with dementia working with the Dementia Alliance. DATA (DEBT ADVICE TAVISTOCK AREA)

DATA (Debt Advice, Tavistock Area) has been running for just over 6 years. We are a charity supported by TACT providing completely free advice to anyone in need, helping local people with debt management, debt relief orders, bankruptcy, dealing with creditors and bailiffs. We are affiliated to the Christian debt advice group Community Money Advice (CMA).

Clients We have had 27 new referrals during 2018 and currently have in excess of 80 active clients; some are very demanding of time and others much less so. Client debts range in size from around £500 to some in the region of £60,000. The total debt of currently active clients is around £1,250,000;

Referring agencies Our referrals this year have come from a range of agencies, outlined below:

We have noticed a big increase in referrals from the CAB; they refer to us because they are unable to easily do Debt Relief Orders so use our facilities for that.

Advisers We are very grateful for all the work our advisers do on behalf of our clients, in many cases "going the extra mile" to provide a good service. We have, however, suffered a drop in advisers available to our service over the last year; some have had to suspend their involvement temporarily because of pressure of responsibilities, others have felt it right to bring their involvement with DATA to an end, having worked with us for a number of years. As a result, we need to recruit additional advisers and we will explain more at the AGM. Giving debt advice is a great privilege but it is not for everyone; it requires advisers to be computer literate and to see clients' financial situations clearly. To help our service we are keen to explore the possibility of having a team of "budget buddies" and to increase the number of "Chaperones" we have. Budget buddies would be people who would not give debt advice but would help clients form a budget and monitor it. As most of our work is in the clients' homes, we avoid seeing a client alone and for this reason need "chaperones" who simply accompany us, have conversation with the client and the adviser when appropriate and quietly pray for a good outcome.

Financial Support Our Debt Advice group could not operate without the support of parent organisation Community Money Advice. CMA ensures we keep up with current regulations and good practice and it is our helpline for advisers with tricky cases. Annual subscriptions are £995 p.a.; this sum ensures we are well informed, well trained and have a good computer software package. Other **expenditure** for 2017-18 is listed below:

TAVISTOCK FOOD BANK

It is my pleasure to offer this report to TACT, as the Acting Chair. Caroline Mitchell served for one year as our Chairperson and threw herself into that role with great enthusiasm. In a short time, she was able to understand the full operation of the Foodbank, the strengths and weaknesses. Caroline helped us prepare for our annual audit by the Regional Supervisor and has ensured that all the recommendations have been implemented. So, I want to begin by thanking Caroline for her assistance over the past year and wish her well for the future, Caroline is continuing her support of the Foodbank but unable to attend trustees meetings due to her work commitments.

Secondly, I want to thank those who give so much of their time and energy for the Foodbank, in order that together, we may support our community. Many of these people have been in place for a number of years. My thanks go to Anne Luxton our Secretary, Linda Medland our volunteer co-ordinator, Tony Welsh our warehouse manager, Harry Richards who brings in the food from the supermarkets each week, John Medland our Treasurer, Andrew Bruff our Communications Officer and, of course, all the volunteers, who attend regular shifts on Fridays.

Next, I would like to thank our Church Representatives who are a vital link to our local churches who regularly attend our committee meetings. We are continually indebted to Tavistock United Reformed Church who accommodate us week by week, not only as a distribution point, in providing storage for the tonnes of food that we handle and providing food, refreshments for clients and volunteers. We thank the Redeemer Church for their monthly collections for the Foodbank.

I would also like to thank Tavistock Area Christians Together who oversee our work and take an active interest in maintaining the Foodbank and keeping it in focus through its regular email communications and its webpages.

I would like to thank all the generous donors from our community who regularly donate food and money to Foodbank, the vast majority of our donors remain anonymous, to them we are grateful. I would also like to mention our local supermarkets: Tesco, Co-op and Lidl, for their help and co-operation in providing collection points in their supermarkets and, in addition making donations of food and cash to the project.

Usage: It appears from our data base that usage has been slowly increasing over the last four years:

Christmas 2018 saw a slight drop in the number of Christmas parcels prepared, from 65 to 56, each of these went to families in need. Christmas is a time of giving and the Foodbank received really generous levels of donations, so we were able to meet the demand. We are in touch with other Foodbanks in the South West, as we are able to share the generous donations with other communities in need.

As with any team of people, we have a turnover of volunteers and we are always on the look out for new volunteers in various different roles. We are grateful for the way in which Linda, our Volunteer Co-ordinator approaches the complex task of recruitment, selection and training. We are grateful of the support of Major Pamela Smith who regularly helps as part of her work within the Tavistock Salvation Army, her pastoral gifts are most helpful. I am hoping that we will soon be able to welcome some new trustees to strengthen our links with all the churches in Tavistock and I am particularly keen to identify a new Chairperson in the next six months! It is a privilege to be part of the Foodbank here in Tavistock and we look forward to another year of serving those in need.
